



Portland, OR (PDX)

Portland Union Station was constructed in 1896 by the Northwest Pacific Terminal Company, which was jointly owned by three railroad companies. The familiar "Go By Train" signs on the clock tower were added in 1948. Today, Portland Union Station is situated in an area that boasts a variety of businesses and attractions, at one end of the city's Transit Mall. In 2011, Portland was awarded \$13.6 million to modernize the station from the High-Speed and Intercity Passenger Rail (HSIPR) grants from the 2009 Recovery Act. The station serves three Amtrak routes. In 2016, 590,076 passengers passed through the station and provided revenue valued at \$34,529,913.


*** Rail Passenger Mile - passenger rail miles are determined by multiplying the total number of passengers by the total number of miles traveled.

Oregon is served by 3 train routes—the Cascades, the *Coast Starlight*, and the *Empire Builder*—and 7 stations. Portland is the state's busiest station. The Cascades route is partially supported by the state.


73 percent of the population of Oregon lives within 30 miles of an Amtrak station.

Among Amtrak riders in the state, 12 percent report that they would not have made the trip but for the availability of Amtrak service. The service provides important mobility and access needs for a number of residents. Moreover, the service is used by the full spectrum of income groups across the state's population.

Over 75 Oregon residents worked for Amtrak in FY16, collectively earning \$5.8 million in wages and salaries. Moreover, Amtrak purchased over \$28 million in goods and services from the Oregon economy in FY16.
