

Amtrak Fact Sheet Fiscal Year 2019 Commonwealth of Kentucky

Amtrak Service & Ridership

Amtrak operates two National Network trains through Kentucky:

- The *Cardinal* (tri-weekly Chicago-Indianapolis-Cincinnati-Ashland-Charleston-Charlottesville-Washington-New York)
- The City of New Orleans (daily Chicago-Fulton-Memphis-Jackson-New Orleans)

During FY19 Amtrak served the following Kentucky locations:

Host Railroads & On Time Performance

Amtrak relies heavily on the cooperation of other railroads in order to operate routes using tracks that are not owned or controlled by Amtrak. Host railroads are statutorily required to provide Amtrak trains "preference" over freight transportation. However, on time performance on most host railroads is poor and continues to decline largely due to hosts ignoring their statutory responsibilities.

Listed below are the Amtrak services that operate in Kentucky with each service's host railroads and on-time performance (OTP) in FY19:

Service	Host Railroads	FY19 OTP
Cardinal	CSX, Norfolk Southern, and Buckingham Branch Railroad	50.0%
City of New Orleans	Canadian National	54.1%

[&]quot;On-time performance" represents the percentage of stations at which the train arrives within 15 minutes of the scheduled arrival time.

Amtrak Guest Rewards

At the end of FY19, there were **17,404** members of the Amtrak Guest Rewards program in Kentucky. This is a 11% increase from FY18.

Procurement

Amtrak spent \$7,952,426 on goods and services in Kentucky in FY19, including \$6,711,484 at Louisville.

Employment

At the end of FY19, Amtrak employed 2 Kentucky residents. Total wages during FY19 of Amtrak employees living in Kentucky were \$187,783.

Stations

The Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) requires that stations in the intercity rail transportation system be made readily accessible to and usable by individuals with disabilities. In response, Amtrak developed an ADA Stations Program to bring the stations it serves (and for which it has ADA responsibility) into compliance with ADA requirements and to provide the best possible service to passengers with disabilities in the shortest timeframe and most integrated and efficient way possible.

Maysville: In FY18, Amtrak completed construction on doorway, path of travel, signage and restrooms to bring those elements into compliance with ADA.

Fulton: Amtrak is working with the Fulton Transit Authority to advance a local project to construct a new ADA compliant station, replacing the existing facility on the same site. Amtrak will address the remaining ADA deficiencies identified at the location, including parking, path of access, signage, lighting and platform. Design for this project is expected to begin soon.

South Shore-South Portsmouth: Amtrak performed design activities to address the non-ADA compliant components for which Amtrak has ADA responsibility, an accessible route from the public right of way to the parking, station, and platform, modifying station entrances, and restrooms to meet ADA requirements, and platform city identifier signs and ADA required signage for station and parking. Construction expected Fall of 2020, pending final design approval.
